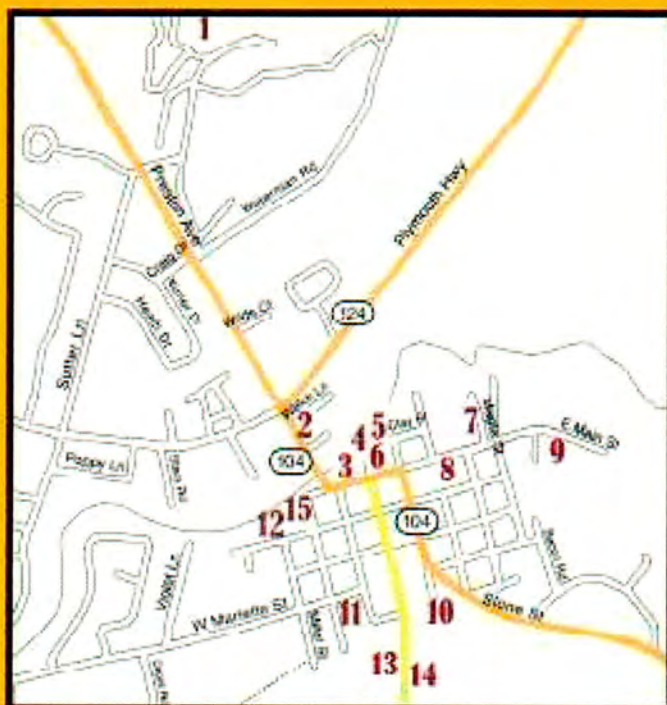


Ione's Historical District Walking Tour

1. Preston Castle, 1894

Preston School of Industry was established to rehabilitate, rather than imprison, youth offenders and once housed Merle Haggard. The first wards were accepted in 1894. Today the buildings are used by film production companies, photographers and local drama groups.

2. Ice House & Brewery, 1840

This 2-story building has served as a brewery, an ice house and then a soda works site. In 1970, it became known as the "Landgraf Building."

3. Lone Hotel, 1910

Originally opened in the early 1850's, the Lone Hotel was rebuilt following a fire in 1910 and re-named the Golden Star Hotel.

4. Iron Ivan, 1901

This engine was manufactured in January 1901 and was brought to the Amador Central Railroad from the McCloud River Railroad in 1937.

5. Pioneer Men & Women, 1850's

This monument was placed in the 1930's by the Native Daughters of the Golden West to honor the struggles of California's founding mothers and fathers.

6. City Hall, 1858

Lone's current City Hall location was originally the site of the 3-story Commercial Hotel.

7. Native Sons of the Golden West, 1880's

Long before the establishment of state historical parks, the Native Sons began campaigns to save the disintegrating buildings of California's history.

8. D. Stewart Building, 1856

The first brick building in Lone was built by Daniel Stewart in 1856 for his general merchandise store.

9. China Town, 1876

At the centennial of 1876, Lone had a population of about 600 which included about 100 Chinese who lived in Lone's Chinatown.

10. Old School Bell, 1858

From the original Lone Elementary School of 1858, this bell was relocated and is on display at the current Lone Elementary School.

11. Methodist Church, 1862

The cornerstone was laid in 1862 and the church was completed in 1866. This church was the first to serve the people in the area.

12. Steam Flour Mill, 1855

Built in 1855, by 1876 it was grinding over 3000 tons of wheat and barley per year, using water from the nearby creek.

13. Catholic Church and Cemetery, 1865

14. Public Cemetery, 1852

The Lone Community Cemetery, next to Howard Park on Church Street, reflects the pioneer history of Lone and dates back to 1852.

15. Lone Pavilion, 1925

This parking lot was the original site of the Lone Women's Club building which was destroyed by fire in 1963.
